## PLACE OF ARTICULATION

This refers to the place in the vocal tract where the two articulators come together. There are eight places.

1)	Bilabial: come together.		
2)	Labio-dental:	come together.	
3)	: tongue contacts teeth.		
4)	Alveolar ridge:	moves towards the gum r	idge just
	behind the upper incisors.		
5)	Post alveolar: tongue tip is close to the position just behind the alveolar		
	ridge, towards the		
6)	: tongue moves towards the roof of the mouth (palate).		
7)	<b>/elar</b> : the back of the tongue moves towards the (velum)		
8)	<b>Glottal</b> : the only glottal consonant in English is /h/ as in how. Strictly speaking, this does not involve two articulators coming together. The		
	sound is simply the	being	expelled
	through the gap between the vocal cords (glottis).
